ACH Group Appoints New Chair

ACH Group has long supported women in leadership positions. Half (four) of its eightmember Board are women, while women account for 50 per cent of the organisation's leadership positions.

According to a report published by South Australia's Office for Women (2015), women make up only 20 per cent of directors on the ASX200 companies and 30 of these boards do not have women members.
